Book Description

The OER book is a cross-disciplinary reference textbook focused on teaching college students how to develop written documents as seen across diverse professions. The edited collection includes individual stand-alone chapters that follow a standard template with content written by experts in a variety of fields. Each chapter is co-authored, with 2-3 experts listed for each chapter submission.

All chapters are peer-reviewed, and once complete, the edited collection is published as an open educational resource (OER) textbook involving a Creative Commons license and stand-alone website. Additional publishing platforms may be added later, such as the Open Textbook Library and Amazon Kindle Publishing.

The goal of the publication is to provide a valuable resource on writing in the disciplines that is easy to access and free of charge to all users. Every chapter is dedicated to the "why" and "how" of a specific type of document found in different professions Document types may include research papers, lesson plans, college essays, critical reviews, lab reports, legal briefs, film/book reviews, crime reports, grant proposals, press releases etc. Once published, users of the edited collection are able to download the entire book or individual chapters based on distinct needs.

High quality un-published works as chapters are invited for the edited collection. The chapters should be developed according to the scope of the call for chapters and the chapter template. Please contact the editor via email to indicate interest and to request the chapter template and submission guidelines.

Writing the Disciplines is modeled after a similar type of OER textbook, <u>The Public Speaking Project</u>. The Public Speaking Project is not affiliated with the editor of Writing the Disciplines, but the speech textbook's chapters gives chapter contributors of Writing the Disciplines an idea of what the basic structure/appearance resembles for the new OER publication.

Once published, the first edition of *Writing the Disciplines* contains 8 chapters. The OER textbook will be reviewed and edited annually with updates, corrections, new resources, and when appropriate, additional chapters. As newer editions are published, additional disciplines and document types will be represented. New editions of the book will be made available in the fall semester, or earlier, of each year.
